




Here are some of our new programs and initiatives for 2021:

A new exhibition featuring the animals, landscapes, people, and culture of Thailand will be complete in 2021! We look forward to welcoming visitors to this new hands-on space when we're able to have guests back in the museum. This new exhibit, called "Thailand: Beauty and Beasts," is made possible thanks to funds from the Decentralization Program, a regrant program of the New York State Council on the Arts with the support of Governor Andrew M. Cuomo and the New York State Legislature and administered by the Lower Adirondack Regional Arts Council.



We are transitioning our regular in-person classroom Museum Programs to a virtual setting, and we are excited to begin offering our Chinese New Year virtual program for classes of students in Pre-K through 8th Grade. 
